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Founded in 2001 by Alberto Vicente and Marcelo Vasconcellos, Mercado Moderno is a gallery focused on Brazilian design. It specializes in vintage furniture from the 1950s to the 1980s, featuring original works by Joaquim Tenreiro, Jorge Zalszupin, Zanine Caldas, and others, along with a concise selection of contemporary pieces.

Based in a historic building in Rio de Janeiro, the gallery welcomes architects, designers, and collectors to explore its curated collection and actively promotes Brazilian design through publications, talks, and exhibitions.



For Design Miami 2025, Mercado Moderno presents a renewed selection of Brazilian Modernist masterworks, emphasizing the materials, forms, and craftsmanship that defined the era. The curation highlights iconic pieces by designers such as Zanine Caldas, Joaquim Tenreiro, and Percival Lafer, showcasing the strength and diversity of mid-century Brazilian design. A small selection of contemporary works, including pieces by Rodrigo Simão and Inês Schertel, appears as a subtle complement — pointing to the ongoing legacy of Brazil's modernist tradition.

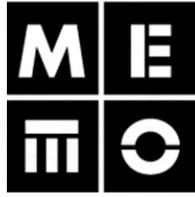

Inês Schertel revitalizes an ancient felting technique from nomadic tribes of China, Iran, and Afghanistan. Working wool by hand with friction, water, and soap, she creates felt — one of humanity’s earliest textiles. This versatile piece functions as a rug, throw, or wall tapestry.



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
